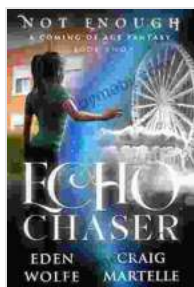


Echo Chaser: An Upper Grade Fantasy Not Enough

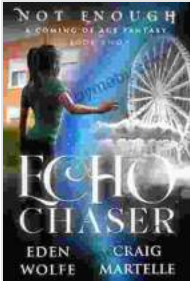
