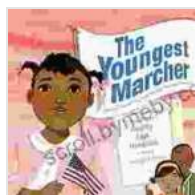


The Story of Audrey Faye Hendricks: A Young Civil Rights Activist Who Changed History

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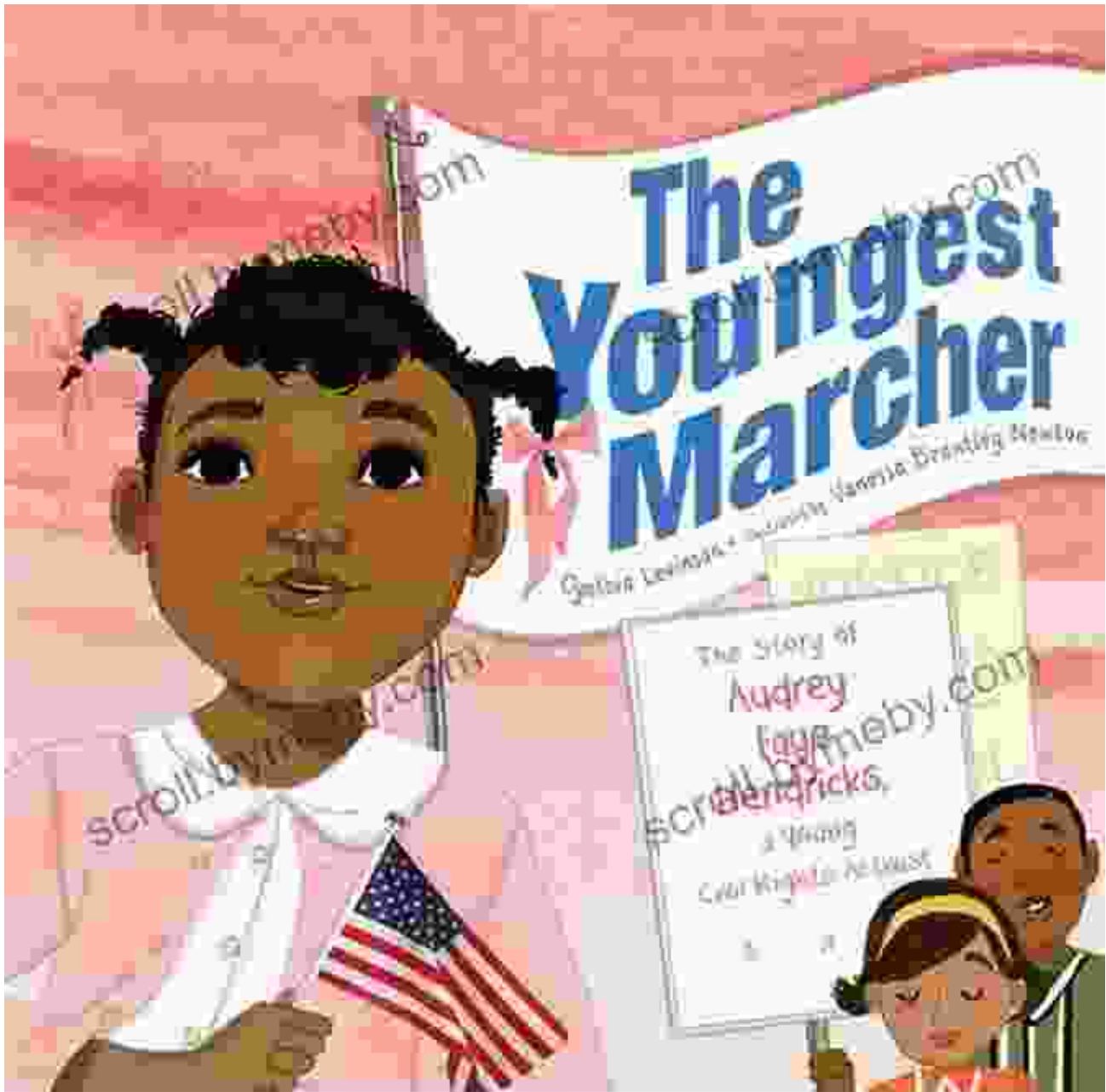

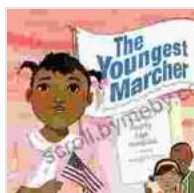
